The Odd Fellows Home and School for the Orphaned Children of North Carolina<sup>[3]</sup> was built on East Ash Street at the corner of Herman Street in Goldsboro by the Grand Lodge of the North Carolina Odd Fellows<sup>[4]</sup>. It was located on a 20-acre tract of land donated in 1891 by W. A. Peacock, a member of the local Odd Fellows lodge<sup>[4]</sup>, and his wife, Hattie. The first child was admitted to the home on 9 May 1892. The home provided for 960 children before closing in 1971. The property was sold to the city of Goldsboro in the late 1970s and became part of a city park. The Wayne County Public Library<sup>[5]</sup> was built on a portion of the land.
