The Warren Junto was the nickname of a group of politicians, led by [Nathaniel Macon](#) ^[3] and all having some connection to [Warren County](#) ^[4], who were instrumental in the growth of the [Jeffersonian Republican Party](#) ^[5] in North Carolina during early statehood. As [President Thomas Jefferson](#) ^[6]'s chief lieutenant in North Carolina, Macon, with his group, contributed greatly to Jefferson's success in the state in the 1800 presidential election. The [Raleigh Register](#) ^[7], the party's official organ, also played a significant role.
