Richmond County, located in the <u>Piedmont</u> [7] region in southern North Carolina, was formed in 1779 from<u>Anson County</u> [11] and was named after Charles Lennox, the third duke of Richmond. Early inhabitants of the area included th<u>Saura</u> [16] (Cheraw) Indians, followed by <u>Highland Scot</u> [17], <u>German</u> [18], <u>Scotch-Irish</u> [19], and English settlers. <u>Rockingham</u> [20], the county seat, was established in 1779 as Richmond Court House; the name was changed in 1785 to honor Charles Watson Wentworth, the Marquess of Rockingham, who maintained friendly relations with the American colonies during the Revolution. Other communities in the county include <u>Hamlet</u> [21], Ellerbe, Ghio, Cordova, and Hoffman. Notable physical features of the county include several lakes, as well as the Pee Dee River, Seaburn Spring, and Naked, Hamer, and Buffalo Creeks.

The <u>North Carolina Motor Speedway</u> [22] in Rockingham, known locally as "the Rock," was an important center for auto racing for decades, hosting <u>NASCAR</u> [23]'s AC Delco 200 Busch Grand National Race and the AC Delco 400 Winston Cup Race and bringing thousands of visitors annually to the county. The track held its last race in <u>February 2004*</u>. County cultural institutions include the <u>National Railroad Museum and Hall of Fame [24]</u>, the <u>Rankin Museum of American and</u> <u>Natural History</u> [25], the Richmond County Community Theatre, and Richmond County Community Concert. Hamlet and Ellerbe have historic districts with many historic houses. The county also hosts a number of annual events, such as Seaboard Festival Day and the Rankin Museum Festival.

Richmond County produces agricultural goods such as cotton, peaches and other fruits, corn,<u>tobacco [26]</u>, vegetables, and soybeans. Manufactured products include textiles and apparel, wood moldings, <u>furniture [27]</u>, plastic closures, poultry processing, and steel fabricators. In 2004 Richmond County's population was estimated to be 46,400.
