[2] William Stuart Primrose, businessman, member of the State Board of Agriculture, and North Carolina State College official, was born in Raleigh [3], the son of John and Eliza Tarbox Primrose. His father, a native of Scotland, was a merchant; his mother, a native of Hebron, Conn., went to Raleigh as tutor for the children of John Devereux [4]. Young Primrose's earliest education was in Raleigh, after which he attended Davidson College [5] for one year; otherwise, he was self-educated. As a young man he was assistant cashier of the State National Bank (1874–78), of which he later became a director. His interest in business inspired him to advocate and support the State Exposition of 1884 [6], and he was elected president of the sponsoring body. When the North Carolina Home Insurance Company was organized, he was elected secretary and in 1885 he became president.

As a member of the influential <u>Watauga Club</u> [7] in Raleigh, a group of the state's leading citizens who sought ways to advance North Carolina, Primrose is said to have been the first person to propose creation of what became <u>North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering</u> [8]. Because he did not have a college degree, he twice declined to be a candidate for president of the college. Nevertheless, he was a strong supporter of the institution and served as president of its board of trustees for twenty years. A building on the campus was named for him. He also served on the board of trustees of <u>Peace Institute</u> [9] and of <u>Davidson College</u> [5].

Primrose, like his parents before him, joined the <u>Presbyterian church [10]</u> as a youth. At age twenty-eight he became a ruling elder of Raleigh's First Presbyterian Church, a position he would fill for the remainder of his life. He also served as superintendent of the Sunday school and sang in the choir. He was an active <u>Mason [11]</u>.

Primrose married Ella Williams, and they became the parents of six sons and a daughter: John Shelton, William S., Jr., Hugh Williams, Robert Owen, Henry Fries, Jesse Lindsay, and Helen (Mrs. R. Y. McPherson). After a funeral at the Presbyterian church, he was buried in <u>Oakwood Cemetery</u> [12], Raleigh.

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
