A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the sinking of the Titanic is documented in history as a terrible tragedy that claimed the lives of one thousand, five hundred and seventeen people, five of whom were American sea post clerks assigned to the ship; and

WHEREAS, Oscar Scott Woody, a native of Roxboro, North Carolina was among those sea post clerks of the era that were experienced and skilled workers who sorted thousands of letters a day, often under difficult conditions; and

WHEREAS, these five men spent their last moments of life struggling to save two-hundred sacks of registered mail by dragging them to the upper decks and possible safety although Titanic crew urged them to leave their work; and

WHEREAS, just moments earlier Oscar Scott Woody had been happily celebrating his forty-fourth birthday with colleagues at the stern of the ship; and

WHEREAS, with the approach of the holiday mailing season we remember postal workers like Oscar Scott Woody who commit themselves each day to deliver the mail through adverse conditions:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, MICHAEL F. EASLEY, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do hereby proclaim November 24th, 2003, as "OSCAR SCOTT WOODY DAY" in North Carolina, and urge all citizens to recognize the contributions made by postal workers throughout history toward the advancement of western civilization.
