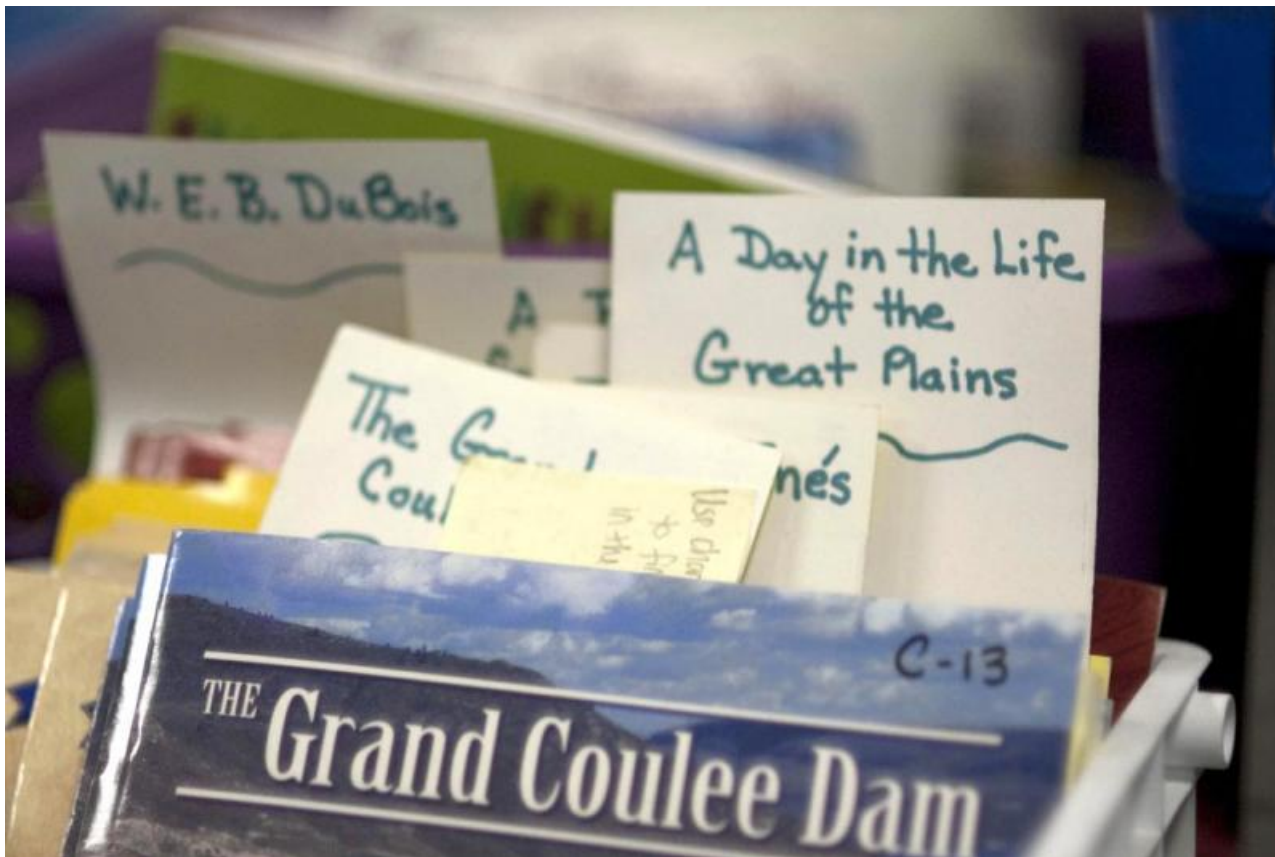


Classroom books
