
Making a fishing net on Janitzio Island

The island is known for its community of Tarascan Indians who fish the lake with their signature "butterfly nets." The island also is home to a tall statue of a hero from Mexico's movement for independence: Jose Maria Morelos.

Pátzcuaro is a small town in the highlands of Mexico in the state of Michoacán. The town predates the arrival of the Spaniards; the Purepecha people have lived in the area since at least 1324. Conquistadors claimed the area for Spain in 1540. The town is well-known for its indigenous heritage, expressed through traditional dances and handcrafted goods.



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
