Charles Thompson: Describe it. How many people were in there and the types of people who were there?

Elberta Hudson: Oh, Lord, it was so many people. It was so many people. It was the Mexican people, black people, white people. And it was a lot of people, you know, young, old, middle age.

Thomas Hudson: They had the whole middle school jammed up with people who started coming.

Elberta Hudson: And it was packed. It was cots side-to-side.

Thomas Hudson: And they didn't have enough room to house them all, so they opened up another, bigger school down at Penderlea.
