"Hooker," a slang word for prostitute, was used in an 1845 letter written by a student to a classmate at the <u>University of North Carolina [4]</u>. This is the earliest known written usage of the word in this sense. The letter was found in the university library's <u>Southern Historical Collection [5]</u> by noted UNC professor and philologist <u>Norman E. Eliason [6]</u>. The date of his finding undermines the popular notion that the term came into usage in the <u>Civil War [7]</u>era in "honor" of Union general <u>Joseph Hooker</u> [8]'s well-documented personal proclivities.
