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Zion-Parnassus Academy

The Zion-Parnassus Academy was an eighteenth-century classical school located in<u>Rowan County</u> [2] about a mile east of <u>Thyatira Church</u> [3] (believed to be the oldest<u>Presbyterian</u> [4] church in western North Carolina). The school's founder (and Thyatira's minister), <u>Samuel Eusebuis McCorkle</u> [5], hoped to establish a school that would stress religious as well as classical learning. Its name recalled the <u>Hill of Zion</u> [6], the residence of King David and his successors, and<u>Parnassus</u> [7], the Greek mountain sacred to Apollo (god of youth, music, and prophecy) and the Muses (goddesses of poetry, art, and science).

Patterned after <u>David Caldwell</u> [8]'s school in <u>Guilford County</u> [9], Zion-Parnassus added a department for teacher training. For this reason, McCorkle's academy has been referred to as the first normal school in America. Forty-five ministers emerged from Zion-Parnassus before it closed around the beginning of the eighteenth century, as did many lawyers, judges, and state officials. In 1798, when the fledgling <u>University of North Carolina</u> [10] held its first commencement, six of the seven graduates were from Zion-Parnassus.
