William Edgar White, <u>furniture manufacturer</u> [3], was born in Mebane, the son of Stephen Alexander and Mary Jane Woods White. He received his education at the <u>Bingham Military Academy</u> [4], located near his home, before working as a <u>telegraph</u> [5] operator for the <u>Southern Railway</u> [6] until 1881. With his brother, David A., and a capital investment of \$420, he then established the <u>White Furniture Company</u> [2], of which he was president until his death over half a century later. The company made furniture of the highest quality and earned an international reputation.

As a <u>Republican [7]</u> White was active in local political affairs and a member of the school board; he was a director of the <u>State Fair [8]</u> and helped organize the Mebane tobacco market. A member of the <u>Presbyterian church [9]</u>, he was involved in its work. White never married. The White Furniture Company ceased operations in 1994.
