


A National Hollerin Contest is held every year in NC in Spivey's Corner. If your family and friends had a hollerin contest, who do you think would win?

## Draw a WAMPUS!




# MAKE

## a book


**1** Fold a piece of paper in half.




**2** Fold paper in half again.



**3** Open out last fold, then fold paper in half the other way.




**4** Open out last fold and cut halfway along the middle crease.



**5**

Unfold paper completely, then fold in half horizontally.



**6** Push the right and the left sides of the paper to the middle...



...making a shape like a plus sign.



**7** Fold the plus sign flat. Then fold the pages together and you have a book!
